

A blitz 7 double-rounder, the tournament provided plenty of exciting chess, each participant playing 14 games in total. At the top, players swapped positions as the competition progressed.

IM Anthony Atanasov emerged victorious with respectable 11.5/14, ahead of second-place FM Eilia Zomorrodian with 10.5 points. Rounding up the top with 10 points each were IM Nicholas Vettese. Geordie Derraugh. Fengxi Mao and CM Koosha Jaferian. Although competing all in one section, the classprize winners all had to steal points from stronger favourites to get their name on the scoreboard.
